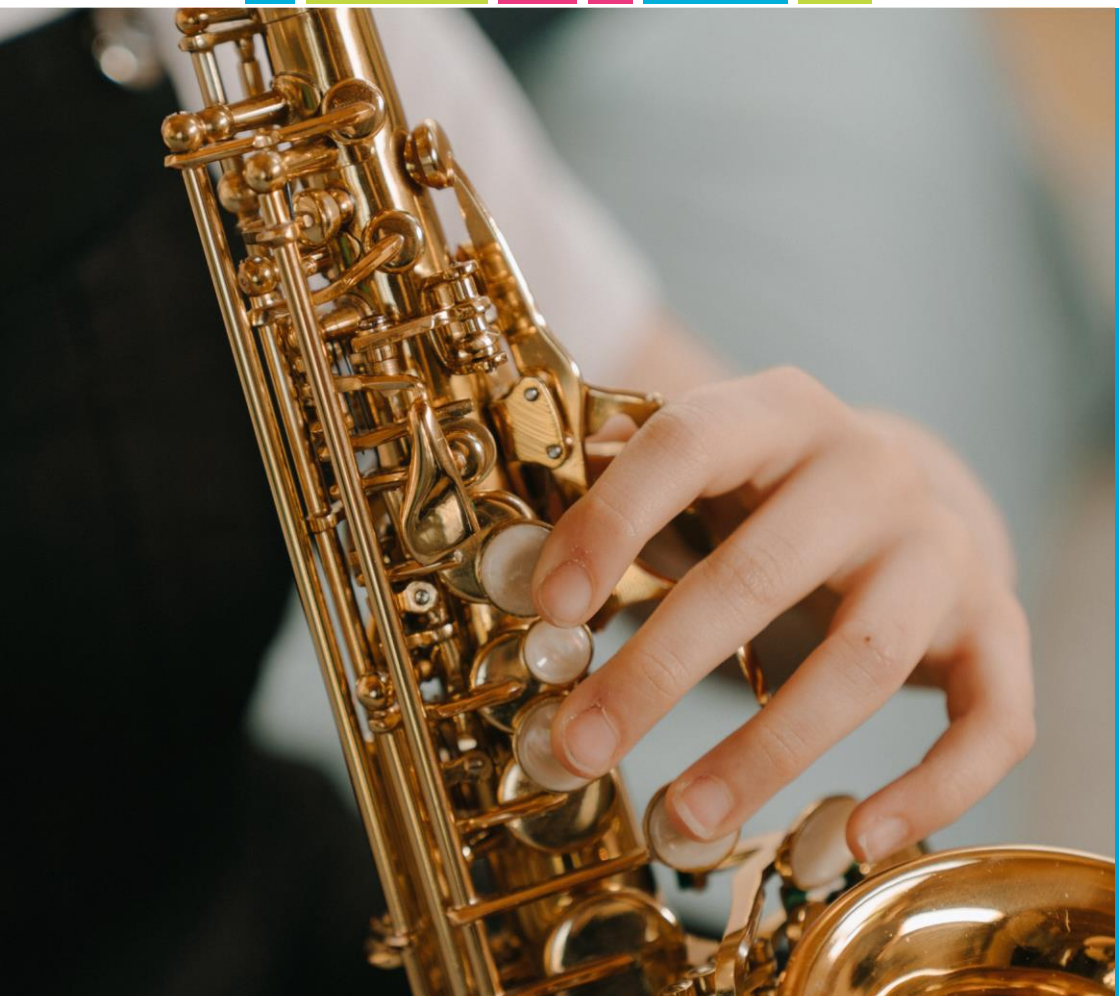

# SGHS Music Tuition Service Aims and Ethos

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Here at SGHS, we believe that learning a musical instrument provides valuable opportunities, skills and enjoyment which translate into all areas of our students' lives.

Learning an instrument improves focus, organisation, mathematical and language skills, gross and fine motor skills, coordination, communication skills, responsibility, and the ability to work independently and as a team. It provides opportunities to meet new people, to travel, communicate with people of a wide range of ages and experiences and to perform in a variety of venues and situations.

In addition, instrumental and music theory exams passed at grade 6 or above attract UCAS points.

The Music Department at SGHS is very fortunate to have a team of talented, dedicated, inspiring and experienced visiting instrumental teachers, who provide lessons during the school day. Students can take graded examinations if they wish and work towards both individual and group performances and competitions.

## Ensembles

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Taking part in ensembles provides additional opportunities for performances, social interaction, team work and travel. It also plays a vital role in developing and applying the skills learnt in instrumental lessons. We expect students learning an instrument to take an interest in at least one school ensemble. # Performance Opportunities

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Regular performance experience gives those learning an instrument the opportunity to show off their talents and gives them something to work towards in between/in place of exams. It also provides opportunities for staff and students to hear a variety of music during the school year.

As well as the more formal summer and winter concerts, we also run a Music Festival each year in the Spring Term where students compete to be the best in their class.

Cabaret Night collaborates Music, Dance & Drama with an evening bursting with numbers from the Musicals.

Students are also invited and encouraged to perform at the beginning and end of Gatherings each week, either as soloist or in pre-rehearsed ensembles.

In addition, student-led/organised concerts and joint musical productions with Ermysted's Grammar School provide performance opportunities for our students.

Wherever possible, we encourage students to perform alongside professional musicians, including their teachers, where they can learn important rehearsal and performance skills.

# Music Theory and Aural Training

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Many students working towards higher grades wish to take Grade 5 theory. Student learning an instrument in school will be eligible to attend additional lessons towards their ABRSM Grade 5 Music Theory exam.

Students will also be given the opportunity to attend sessions in aural training, which is an important element in achieving the highest marks in graded examinations.

# Instruments

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In most cases, good quality student instruments are readily available for rent and can also be purchased both new and second hand. New instruments can be purchased through the school VAT free and music staff or instrumental tutors will happily advise regarding suitability and purchase price.

# Tuition Costs

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Students receive one 30min lesson per week, 30 lessons per year. The total cost of lessons is divided up to be paid monthly over 10 months (September to June). Costs per month are as follows:

Individual 30 minutes ..... **£56.40 per month**

You will be billed monthly and pay via Parent Pay, or you can pay for a year/ term in advance.

We regret that refunds or lesson credit cannot be given for lessons missed by students.

# Lesson Times

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Lessons take place during the school day. We try to ensure that no student misses the same lesson two weeks in a row and in most cases, lessons are spread out considerably more than this. Students will not miss PE or Food Technology lessons, due to the practical nature of the lessons. As curriculum lessons are one hour in duration students should never miss the whole lesson but will be supported to catch up on any work missed.

## Instrumental Tutors

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### Mrs Wills

Sarah Wills started playing the piano, as well as flute and viola, at primary school in Edinburgh and has been teaching the piano in Skipton since 2008. In 2017, Sarah graduated with distinction from the Piano Teachers' Certificate course of the European Piano Teachers' Association, and believes in keeping a love of music making at the heart of teaching. She is passionate about

helping students to find music that inspires them to play, and includes composition, arranging and improvisation into lessons. Sarah has been involved with Skipton Music Festival for a number of years, most recently as Treasurer, and enjoys playing regularly in a chamber music ensemble.



## Mr Giudici

Marco Giudici studied clarinet both in Italy and in Germany, where he obtained his Postgraduate Certificate in Music Performance with a distinction. He then freelanced both in Italy and England, performing with orchestras such as the National Italian Radio Orchestra, the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra and the D'Oyly Carte Opera Company.



Many of his students have become members of prestigious youth orchestras, including the National Children's Orchestra of Great Britain, National Youth Orchestra of Great Britain and Hallé Youth Orchestra. Some were also offered places to study at the Royal College of Music, RNCM, Birmingham Conservatoire and Leeds College of Music.

## Mrs Carrington

Emma is a professional opera singer and teacher who completed her studies at the Royal Academy of Music. She has performed as a soloist at The Royal House (Covent Garden), English National Opera, Welsh National Opera, Scottish Opera, Opera North, Glyndebourne and abroad in Italy, France and South America. As well as teaching at Skipton Girl's High School, she teaches at Harrogate High School. Emma has a private teaching practice at home, runs a musical theatre club for adults during the summer months and conducts a community choir in winter.



## Mr Flockton

Mr Flockton studied music at Leeds and Sheffield at both under and post graduate level. He has taught music, specialising in the guitar for over 15 years, teaching across many age ranges and abilities. His instrument is the guitar, electric, acoustic, classical and he also plays banjo and ukulele. He has won two most inspiring teaching nominations. His teaching approach is based on encouragement to enjoy learning within a structured, progressive framework. He is also a professional performer, writing, performing and collaborating across a wide range of musical settings, projects and genres.



## Mrs Jones

Louise was born in Hartlepool, and at fifteen pursued her studies with Diana Cummings of the Royal Academy of Music in London, before undertaking her degree at the Royal Northern College of Music. Her years in Manchester included a period of combining teaching and playing with ensemble management roles at the RNCM. Louise is a founder member of Skipton Camerata, leading on
